If we apply our pursuits of knowledge, seek to understand the perspectives of those we encounter, and practice tolerance, seeking out our commonalities rather than our differences, we may yet be able to effect positive change and thwart the darkness of ignorance with an every brightening light.

Masons do not exist in a vacuum. Our participation in the Craft is more the responsibility of our friends and family who support us and encourage us in our endeavors. Therefore, our Masonic teachings do not end with the individual Mason. They have the potential to radiate out into the world in which we live, if we personify and live them. I stand before you tonight honored and humbled. As the 159th Worshipful Master of Alexandria – Washington Lodge, I am inspired by the men who have served in this position before me.

It was our most well-known Master, Illustrious Brother George Washington, who brought me to Freemasonry, but it has been the Masters who I have known personally who have taught me, inspired me, and assisted me in preparing for this role (would all the Past Masters of AW22 please rise). Thank you, gentlemen.

To many, a Masonic Lodge may appear to be nothing more than a club, but to those of us who have obligated ourselves to the Craft, we know it to be "an unwavering system of morality" where we are united in fundamental beliefs and dedicated to a greater pursuit of knowledge, perspective, and tolerance. We learn to set aside differences and form bonds. I know that I am embarking on a journey this evening where I will have my brothers to assist me in facing every challenge and to celebrate with me in every triumph.

At the Grand Annual Communication in November, Grand Master Douglas Vernon Jones asked in his inaugural address if, as Masons, our finest hour had come and gone. Many people have questioned if Alexandria-Washington Lodge has any worth outside of its relationship to George Washington.
